## CLUB INFORMATION

Havasu Gold Seekers, Inc. is a non-profit gold seekers club in Lake Havasu City, Arizona with 20 gold bearing claims, covering over 3200 acres.

The Club was started in early 1991 when a small group of Lake Havasu City residents got together for the purpose of recreational gold prospecting in the desert near Lake Havasu City, Arizona. The Club started with about 20 men and women and grew slowly until February of 1992 when Captain Dan McCarty and seven other members formed an association and filed four placer claims totaling 640 acres. At the very next club meeting the Club elected officers and adopted by-laws. The newly elected President, Dan McCarty, Vice-President, Denny Craig, and Secretary, Elaine Babb, had the tough job of making things work well for the benefit of all club members. From that point on the Club has grown to over 350 members. HGS purchased its own land near the claims for Club activities such as family outings, BBQ's, camping and of course, GOLD PROSPECTING!

From September through May, the Havasu Gold Seekers, Inc. meets in the Havasu Room at the Quality Inn & Suites Motel on the first Tuesday of each month at 7:00 p.m. The Board Meeting precedes the general meeting at 6:00 p.m.

Yearly individual or family membership dues are \$40 and are due by December 31. Family membership includes family members under 18. The initiation fee for a new membership is \$140. The total cost for new members the first year is \$140 and \$40 thereafter. The dues are used to send out a monthly newsletter, pay miscellaneous expenses, and pay the fees on all of the Club's gold claims

## COMMON DIG RULES

### PLEASE ABIDE BY THE FOLLOWING RULES

- No early birds – No buckets filled before start time.
- No equipment within marked area.
- Hand tools such as shovels, picks and buckets in dig holes only.
- NO METAL DETECTORS ALLOWED IN DIG HOLE AT ANY TIME
- No metal detectors or dry washers inside dig area
- Form one line with two buckets per person only.
- Private holes 10x10 OK to claim giving right of way to digger.
- Dirt piles OK for 72-hour private claim, but not in common dig holes.
- Do not cut tree roots or cactus, and as always, leave access open to where equipment is classifying for dirt removal.
- MEMBER'S GUEST NOT ALLOWED TO PARTICIPATE IN COMMON DIGS.
- **PACK IT IN – PACK IT OUT.** - Revised 10-09

## BLM ROAD CLOSURE NEWS

Due to the large number of comments and the involvement of the Havasu City Officials and the Mohave Board of Supervisors, BLM has extended the comment period to February 28<sup>th</sup>. This will give us a chance to get out to our claims and map some of the roads that BLM has closed or ignored.

They have stated that washes are no longer considered routes unless designated with a route number. We have also discovered that some of the roads have been cut short, such as HN330 which is the road to the Scotts Well area. With the road ending way short to the Scott Wells area we will not have access to our claims HGS 17 and HGS 18.

I will leave a map of the closures at the Fran Lowell Building at Base Camp. Please refer to the two previous newsletters for more information.

## **DRIVING THE STAGECOACH**

The man, or in some cases, the woman who drove the stagecoach was admired by nearly everyone. The stagecoach driver was also known as a "whip," Knight of the Lash," "Jehu," or "sagebrush navigator." A good and experienced driver was highly valued. At times it was the driver's bravery, skill, experience and determination that brought the stage through bad weather, rain-filled rivers, bandit encounters and Indian attacks.

This "whip" was a master of the reins, or "ribbons," and was able to handle a lively team with skill. In his left hand he would interlace the reigns through his fingers to command his team. With his right hand he would handle the coach brake, whip, scatter gun or anything else that might require his attention. (Good multi-tasking!)

He was reliable and a master of many tasks. He was able to take passenger tickets, be polite to the ladies, and keep to a schedule. He was entrusted with young children riding alone, and his decision was the law between stops.

Surprisingly, these men were sometimes drifters who were wanted by the law. Sometimes they were men looking for a temporary job that

would last only a few months to provide them with cash for their other adventures, such as gold mining. There were also drivers who made this their career and had established routes.

These "Knights of the Lash" received what was considered high pay for the times. Some earned as much as \$125 a month plus room and board.

Each driver invested in a special whip that was unique to him. Depending on the number of stock the driver was handling, whips varied from 4.5' to 11-16' in length. The most common size for the six-up was a 9' whip comprised of buckskin lashes on a 5' hickory packed stock.. Each driver set up different designs of silver, carvings or decorations on the stock, making it the only one of its kind. The driver kept his whip in excellent condition by keeping the rawhide oiled and any silverwork polished. The driver treated his whip with great care; coiled the whip and hung it up. He would never allow his whip to be handled by another or drag in the dirt.. The whips became so identifiable with their drivers that the town folk and other drivers would know which "Jehu" was in the saloon just by seeing his whip hanging on the hook. . Contrary to popular movie lore, a competent driver used the crack of his whip sparingly. The driver did not want to startle the passengers or spook his team by the sharp "cracking" sound....

Some drivers also spent their wages on fancy clothes, hats and boots. Other drivers spent wages on fancy riggings that they took with them from line to line.

The driver carried his own bedding and

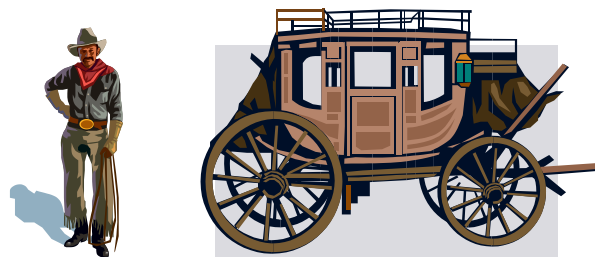
supplies and packed them somewhere in the boot. They included a, water bag, toolbox, medical kit and a lantern. The jockey box held an ax, shovel and sometimes a pick-mattock. The wagons were also equipped with a spare wheel tied under the coach, and a spade to scrape the wheels of debris if necessary. If there were no guards riding with the driver, he would have some type of weapon for defense; usually a scatter gun.

On a six-horse hitch, the team was hitched up to the coach in a tapered order according to the weight and size of the horses. The largest and strongest two horses (about 1200 pounds each,) were in the very back for pulling power. They were called "wheelers." The lighter, more spirited front horses (about 800 pounds each) were called the "leaders."

He drove the horses at a moderate gallop unless the road was curved or steep. Here a skilled driver would slow the team pace down to a gentle trot or walk. When approaching a town, the driver would whip the team up to a lively gallop in order to make a good entrance.

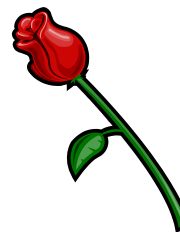
These drivers were the "rock stars" of their era. Most of the stagecoaches were made by the Concord Company, and they were beautifully and richly painted. The entire process of "staging a run" was developed around the driver and his team of horses. Every effort was made to keep the driver on schedule with a minimum "down time." What an exciting and adventurous time these drivers must have experienced!

## HOW SOME TOWNS GOT THEIR NAME

**PHOENIX:** takes its names from a flag -raising ceremony commemorating the nation's 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence. A party of colonists from Boston was camped at the foot of the San Francisco Peaks on July 4, 1876.

**PRESCOTT:** was named for the historian, William Hickling Prescott, beating out Gimletville as the people's choice.

**TUCSON:** was the Spanish corruption of the Indian words *ChukShon*, which described the "Dark Base At The Foot Of A Nearby Mountain."

**YUMA:** is a corruption of the Quechan word, *Umo*, or "smoke." It seems the early natives used smoky firebrands to ward off mosquitoes. Yuma, named for the Indian tribe living at the legendary river crossing, was a riverport town during the heyday of the steamboats on the Colorado River.

**SIERRA VISTA:** used to be called Frye. Nobody wanted to admit to moving to "Frye" in Arizona so they changed it.
